Rush, island EMS leader, lauded in retirement

Spent 36-year career with Chincoteague

Chincoteague Mayor Denise Bowden understands that Bryan Rush, the island's director of emergency management, has earned his retirement.

But she still hated to see it happen, saying it was "so sad to see him retire."

"He is one amazing man that I have the utmost respect for," said Bowden of Rush, who began working for the town of Chincoteague in 1990 as a teenager in the public works department.

Rush served Chincoteague for 36 years but he is best known for his work developing the island's emergency medical services into its own unit — and seeing the department grow from two employees to 28. Its EMS previously had been integrated with Accomack County's.

"It kind of was my baby," Rush said of the progress the department has made in his time there, thanks in large part to his efforts.

Said Bowden, "What he has done for EMS, no one could ever have come close."

Rush recalled his first day working

for the town was June 18, 1990, three days after he graduated from high school.

In 1992, he began working in EMS for Chincoteague as one of two people working five days a week as a supplement to Accomack County's EMS operations on the island.

He helped expand the department as the island's needs for EMS grew.

"We were all like a family," Rush said of the relationship among staff in the department.

"Bryan has been through every stage of our department's journey from a strictly volunteer EMS provider to having full-time staffing," the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company posted on its website in a retirement tribute.

"This was a monumental step forward for the safety of our residents and visitors to the island," the statement read. "Bryan's dedication to that mission and the safety of the island is unparalleled."

Rush said the family-like relationship is due in large part to the experiences the staff undergoes together regularly — tidal flooding, coastal storms, the COVID-19 pandemic, and much more.

Those situations build expertise, camaraderie, and trust.

"Bryan has been a steadfast leader and wealth of knowledge to those working under him," the fire company's statement read.

As director, Rush credits his proactive manner for helping develop the unit, saying he always tried to think 3-5 years into the future to consider problems before they arose.

Rush also was appointed to the governor's EMS advisory board in 2021, an experience he described as "eye opening."

In his retirement, Rush, 54, plans to travel, and he is not waiting around.

Later this month, he and his wife, Arla Jo, are taking a two-months-long trip driving cross-country to Washington state.

Rush said after his daughter, Linda, passed away in March 2021 at the age of 30, he and his wife have been committed to living their lives to the fullest.

He also figures he likely will continue to help his community in some way, but he does not yet know how.

The longtime emergency services director is looking forward to his retirement, although Rush fears he will miss the rush.

"I really wonder, 'Am I going to miss the chaos?'" he asked.

Town council tables changes to island STR rules

The Chincoteague Town Council on Monday, June 1, voted to table a proposal to limit short-term rentals in the town's R-1 district pending a further study.

In all, 36 people spoke during a public hearing on the proposal, which would grandfather current rentals but stop the establishment of new rentals in the zoning district.

Almost all of the speakers were firmly against the proposal, saying the popular vacation town does not have a problem with STRs. Others said it infringed on property rights and would hurt property values.

"The town is proposing an action that would severely restrict the fundamental right for an owner to use their property as they see fit," said

Ken Hirschmugl.

Other speakers said income from short-term rentals was not a means of getting wealthy — it was a way to keep family homes and fund renovations for newly purchased homes.

"Rental income is not about getting rich," said Sarah Potter. "It helps offset rising mortgage payments, insurance, utilities, maintenance, and property taxes."

Fourteen people spoke at a second hearing on a proposal that would increase annual short-term rental fees to \$500, up from \$50, and require town inspections of the rentals.

Members of the town council, some of whom said the fee was too high, voted to have a committee do more research on a suitable fee.

"A \$500 fee is excessive," said Councilman Gene Wayne Taylor.

The meeting, which began at 7

p.m., lasted more than four hours and was held in the Chincoteague Center to accommodate the large crowd.

Hirschmugl questioned the premise of the proposed STR changes, saying his neighborhood has not had bad experiences with them.

John McGoldrick, an officer with the Eastern Shore Association of Realtors, said the group "strongly opposes any actions that would removing an existing use by right from the current or future property owners."

"My impression, hearing all of the arguments, is that this is a solution in search of a problem rather than a problem in search of a solution," said Tilmer Engebretson.

Councilman Chris Bott, who also chairs the town's planning commission, said the town was looking at STRs because of their potential community impact.

"In my opinion, the 'why' is the community," he said, mentioning by name a number of churches, volunteer groups, and adult and youth organizations that thrive because of residents.

"It's the preservation of the community — that's my main goal," Bott said. "It all adds up to a pretty fantastic place."

Added Mayor Denise Bowden, "we do have to strike that balance" between year-round residents and short-term rentals.

Planning commission member Pat Farley said half of Chincoteague's housing stock is in short-term rentals.

Council members were open to suggestions that a study be conducted and more research be completed.

"You've given us some real good information," said Councilman Jay Savage.

Appeals board ends construction on battery facility

The Accomack County Board of Zoning Appeals ended the construction of an electricity storage facility near Wattsville on Wednesday, June 3, because work did not begin on the property within the three-year window allowed by the permit.

Representatives of the project's owner, Scout Storage LLC, said work on the facility, which uses large batteries to store electricity to be used during energy-grid demand, actually had begun — much of the project is being built offsite before being transferred to the property.

Scout Storage's attorney, George Bowles, also said Lee Pambid, Accomack's deputy county administrator of planning and community development, approved a site plan for the project eight months after the conditional use permit for it had expired.

Bowles said the county indicated no problems with the facility's progress before a stop-work order was issued April 1 — three weeks after the site plan was approved.

Scout Storage received a preliminary court injunction to continue work on the property until the board of zoning appeals met to rule on the matter.

Pambid called signing off on the site plan an "inadvertent approval." Accomack County attorney Jan Proctor said a county employee's mistake does not override provisions of the zoning ordinance.

"The county made the mistake in approving the site plan and land disturbance permits," she said, adding the county is "not bound by these mistakes."

Bowles said Scout Storage may appeal the appeals board's decision to the circuit court.

The five-member appeals board voted, 3-1, to uphold the county's ruling that Scout Storage did not begin the project until after the permit had expired. Appeals board member Logan

Holland did not attend the meeting.

Bowles said the project is "within weeks" of being completed. Construction work on the project is easily seen by drivers on Chincoteague Road.

Harold Patterson, the owner of the company building the facility, said "\$10 million worth of batteries" already have been ordered for the project.

Calvert Seybolt, an appeals board member, voted against ending the project, saying Pambid's approval of the site plan should allow it to continue.

"That's a tough pill to swallow here," Seybolt said. "When I sign something, I get held responsible."

Patterson's company had purchased the project from its former owner in April 2025 — three months before the conditional-use permit allowing it was to expire.

Appeals board member Lynn Gayle, who made the motion to uphold the stop-work order, said the new owner should have asked for an immediate extension of the permit.

A large crowd of residents living

near the electricity storage facility spoke against allowing it to proceed.

Speakers were concerned about potential noise and said it is out of character with the neighborhood.

"It is part of the landscape that shaped my childhood," said Savannah Fuller.

In a written report, Pambid apolo-

gized for approving the site plan after the permit had expired.

"It was an honest mistake and was not in any way intended to make things more difficult or expensive," he wrote.

He also apologized "to the community for any distress or inconvenience that this has caused."

Zoning amendment would add flexibility in town edge districts

Northampton County is proposing a zoning amendment that would allow more flexibility for owners of properties in the town edge, or TE-1, zoning district.

Currently, TE-1 zoning already exists in Northampton County. The amendment would allow for TE-R, or town edge-residential zoning.

“The ordinance before the county is not a development proposal. It does not approve any project or rezone any land,” said Northampton County Administrator Matt Spuck.

The change would allow for higher density development within town edge zones.

Spuck said higher densities would allow for more affordable housing because nearby supporting infrastructure is already in place and units are often smaller.

The change does not allow for by-right or planned unit developments, called PUDs.

Owners of land in the town edge zone would be able to apply for rezoning to town edge-residential land.

The rezoning process would still require a discussion from both the planning commission and board of supervi-

sors, with public hearings held at both meetings, Spuck said.

Town edge zoning occupies about 1.3% of land in the county. The zoning district was established in 2016.

TE-1 zoning surrounds much of the towns of Exmore, Nassawadox, Eastville, Cheriton, and Cape Charles.

While TE-1 zoning only allows for one dwelling unit per five acres, TE-R zoning allows for up to one dwelling unit per two acres, or up to five dwelling units per acre when served by municipal water and sewer.

Duplexes and townhouses would be allowed on TE-R land, and apartments would be considered through a spe-

cial-use permit process.

A public hearing for the ordinance change is scheduled to take place June 16, but Northampton County residents Ken Dufty and Steve Lawson have requested it to be delayed, “until and unless there is a public information session involving representatives from the incorporated towns and the citizens of this great county,” a letter from Dufty and Lawson read.

The request for the delay is so everyone involved can be properly informed on the potential consequences of the amendment, Dufty and Lawson stated in the letter.

Naming roads for heroes should happen more

One of our favorite designations happened on Memorial Day. A roadway was named for a local dignitary. It should happen more frequently on the Eastern Shore.

The stretch of Route 316 from Parksley to Bloxom is now the David R. Chew Jr. Memorial Road, named for the first responder, minister, and all-around good guy who died in an emergency vehicle crash June 16, 2012. It is a well-deserved honor. Let's have more of them.

Before Chew, the last Eastern Shoreman to have a memorial road named in his honor was Philip M. "Karo" Daffin, for whom the Tasley overpass was named in 2021. Daffin was a Virginia Department of Transportation employee on the Eastern Shore who died while at work in 1978.

Before that, memorial roads on the Eastern Shore were named for boardroom-and-necktie gentry — the Lucius J. Kellam Jr. Bridge-Tunnel, Charles M. Lankford Memorial Highway, the John B. Whealton Memorial Causeway, and such.

More recently, we have had Ruth Wise Road in Exmore, named for the woman who spearheaded the rebirth of the New Road community. Wise, a community leader in full and a model trailblazer, died nine years ago.

Who will be the next influential Eastern Shore patriarch or matriarch to have a road named in their honor?

Wear Orange Days were established in 2015 to honor the memory of Hadiya Pendleton, who was shot and killed on a playground.

Her friends decided to wear orange (the color hunters wear in the woods to be safe and keep others safe) to honor her.

Here are some facts: The firearm mortality rate in the United States is higher than 93% of all other countries.

Nearly 130 people in the U.S. are killed every day by some form of gun violence. Many more are wounded or traumatized.

Nearly 20% of Americans lost a family member to gun violence — this includes suicides

and domestic abuse and it is the leading cause of death for Americans age 1 to 17.

We need to do something. Recently we saw another shooting in San Diego, Calif., at a mosque and school by two teenagers.

Five people died that day, including those shooters. Children were traumatized. Whole communities are traumatized.

We have seen instances of gun violence right here on the Eastern Shore recently. It is not getting better.

New legislation may help — let's hope. Asking people to register their guns not only protects them but it protects

innocent people who may be harmed if those guns are stolen and not reported.

Locking guns up safely protects children from having access to them or from them being stolen. None of these laws takes away guns but they can save lives.

I ask you to please wear orange June 5 to 7 to honor those who are victims and survivors of gun violence.

I ask this as the parent of an armed robbery survivor. Believe me, that is a call you never want to get.

On May 31, 1943, three planes crashed here, killing a pilot

There were many military airplane crashes on the Eastern Shore in the 1940s and 1950s, some of them involving fatalities.

On May 31, 1943, three planes crashed on the Eastern Shore that “fell while in flight formation,” the Eastern Shore News reported.

One of the pilots parachuted to safety in Bell’s Neck, north of Willis Wharf. His plane crashed nearby.

The second “made a forced landing” on the beach at Parramore Island.

The third airplane was missing altogether. Its pilot, U.S. Navy Reserve Ensign Sidney Carol Claiborne, a native of Texas, also could not be found.

Almost two weeks later, Claiborne’s body washed ashore on Parramore Island. Some airplane wreckage also was found.

The other two pilots were not injured.

The remains of Claiborne, 21, are interred in a Lubbock, Texas, cemetery.

■ On June 5, 1945, a pilot stationed at the Chincoteague Naval Auxiliary Air Station crashed the airplane he was flying near Stockton, a Maryland town near the Accomack County border.

U.S. Navy Lt. Robert Harold Anderson, 26, resided with his wife in nearby Public Landing when he was killed.

An article in The Daily Times newspaper of Salisbury, Md., stated Anderson’s airplane went down three miles northwest of Stockton on a farm owned by Herman Trader.

“When the plane hit the ground, it burst into flames and burned with the pilot trapped in the cockpit,” the newspaper reported.

A native of Eau Claire, Wis., Anderson’s gravesite also is there. In addition to his wife, he also was

survived by a daughter who had not reached her second birthday.

Anderson had recently returned from the Pacific theater in World War II.

■ U.S. Marine Corps 2nd Lt. Vernon Lee Somers, 29, of Bloxom, was killed in action June 6, 1918, during World War I in the Battle of Belleau Wood, in France.

He posthumously earned the Distinguished Service Cross and the Navy Cross — the second-highest military decoration for Marines.

Somers was a member of Virginia Military Institute’s Class of 1915. A Roanoke Times article from June 20, 1922, recounted that Somers was wounded several times during the battle and told stretcher-bearers carting him away to put him down.

“I am dying, and I want to die with the boys,” the newspaper re-

ported Somers saying.

His last words were, “Stay with them, boys, and show them where you come from,” the paper reported.

His remains were interred in April 1922 at the Parksley Cemetery. An article in the Peninsula Enterprise newspaper called it “the largest crowd in many years” at Bethel Baptist Church.

“It was reported that 3,000 people were at the burial,” the newspaper reported.

The Oct. 4, 1919, edition of the Peninsula Enterprises contains short biographical sketches of the Eastern Shore’s World War I fatalities and shows Somers to be among the area’s honored soldiers.

After graduating from VMI, Somers served as commandant of Georgia Military Academy, according to the biographical account written by the Rev. R. S. Monds.

He resigned the position to take the U.S. Marines physical, but he failed it twice because of “defective eyesight,” Monds wrote. The third time he passed.

“His spirit lies among us today in the principles for which he died and these principles, dear to our hearts, shall ever live,” Monds wrote.

■ U.S. Army Pvt. 1st Class Clarence William “Buddy” Bloxom, of Parksley, was 26 years old when he was killed in action on June 6, 1944 — D-Day — at Omaha Beach, Normandy, France.

Bloxom was a member of the 116th Infantry, of which 800 were classified as dead, wounded, or missing. Bloxom’s remains arrived back in the United States in late 1947 and a funeral was held Dec. 21 of that year.

His remains are interred in the Parksley Cemetery.

■ U.S. Army Pvt. Hugh Franklin Williams, 19, also was killed on D-Day when the aircraft on which he was a passenger was shot down and crashed in northwestern France. Williams, a Tangier Island native, was a member of the 506th Parachute Infantry, 101st Airborne Division.

Williams, a paratrooper, was among 20 servicemen who died in the crash.

Williams’ name is on a headstone with two other servicemen on the fatal flight in the Long Island National Cemetery in New York.

■ U.S. Army Pvt. Vandyke S. Toye, of Accomack County, died June 10, 1945, during World War II.

He served with the 388th Engineer General Service Regiment, which had Black soldiers.

Toye was Black and there is no mention of his death in the Eastern Shore News or Peninsula Enterprise newspapers.

Toye’s remains are interred at the Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial, Colleville-sur-Mer, France.

■ U.S. Army Pfc. Ernest W. Henderson, of Cheriton, died June 11, 1953, during the Korean War.

I have found little about Henderson, who was Black. A newspaper account after his death identified his mother as Mary E. Bell.

It is unknown how old Henderson was at the time of his death. His birth year was 1925 but records do not show the date of his birth.

The article stated his body was one of 198 war fatalities carried back to the United States aboard the USS Sharon Victory.

With a churchyard wink, building trust, camaraderie

Services finally had concluded at the Presbyterian church on a bright spring day. I was 5 or 6 years old.

I yawned and slouched out the door, into the noon daylight, and past the older men, who began to pack Sir Walter Raleigh tobacco into their pipes for an after-sermon smoke and some conversation.

I looked at one of them — a gray-haired man with a gray coat, gray pants, his head framed by gray pipe smoke — and he winked at me.

I smiled in return. It happened that quickly.

I remember the wink more than I remember the sermon or what hymns were sung. I do not even remember what I did later that afternoon.

I just remember being somewhat comforted by the wink.

There were no words spoken and no need for them. A simple wink had communicated a nuanced understanding, connection, and friendliness.

To me, the wink conveyed that probably he also had been roused too early from comfortable sleep, forced to wear uncomfortable clothes, and had his fair fussed over by the Woman of the House.

The wink conveyed that he also would have rather been piddling at home on that Sunday morning than sitting on a hard, wooden pew, but there was technically no other option.

that I was not alone.

In our contemporary world of wordy analysis and breathless explanation, the silent-but-knowing wink is all but extinct.

Yes, there is the wink emoji, but that is usually used to convey playfulness in a text or email after a string of words. And it is not the same as a real, live, face-to-face wink, with no accompanying verbiage.

But today, we have the opposite of the silent wink. In fact, people these days will not stop talking.

We have “mansplainers” — a funny word that combines “man” and “explainer” — who will authoritatively hold forth about whatever topic they overhear to the chagrin of all within earshot.

And we have “momsplainers,”

Sometimes, there is just no way to finagle out of something, especially when the Woman of the House wants her people in church on Sunday morning.

The wink seemed to tell me that he knew how I felt and

which is the word for womenfolk who will not stop giving dissertations on topics, including how to correctly brush your teeth, the importance of wearing clean skivvies, and the like.

These days, we have motormouths and chatterboxes, windbags and talkaholics, keyboard warriors and online oversharers.

None of them communicate nearly as well or clearly as the silent-but-knowing wink delivered by the pipe-smoking man in the churchyard.

Understand also that winks should be used with a degree of caution, because they can be flirty, and therefore dangerous.

For example, a man winking at a woman can be an untoward and creepy act. In the workplace, such an action might prompt a report to the human resources department, and rightfully so.

For a woman to wink at a man could prompt just about anything, knowing men the way I know them.

True story: A couple of years ago, I was hollering at a Philadelphia Phillies baseball game, and a woman heard my hollering, looked my way, and playfully winked at me with a combination of brio and panache. She was an experienced man-winker.

My throat got dry and I began to sweat. I quickly stopped hollering to curtail her interest. I felt the immedi-

ate need to get away from the winking girl from the big city who made me nervous.

But used innocuously and in the right context, the wink very succinctly and silently conveys a lot of words — and an accompanying feeling of camaraderie.

The wink has visual-communication cousins like the nod and the thumbs-up sign that seem to build fellowship, mutual trust, and inclusiveness.

In contemporary times, anything that brings us together, like these gestures do, should be celebrated.

Almost a half-century later after the churchyard wink, I was in the grocery store and saw a child who looked to be 5 or 6 years old.

He yawned and slouched and clung to the shopping cart his mother was pushing.

He looked like he would rather have been anywhere else.

Like me, he simply was not able to finagle himself out of a trip to the grocery store.

I was pushing a cart in the other direction. As we passed, I winked at him. He smiled back.

There were no words spoken and no need for them.

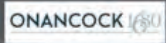

Coates to compete in final high school meet

When you ask old-timers in these parts to name the Shore's greatest female athlete of all time, a few names rise to the top.

There's Kim Giddens, a three-sport star at Nandua High School in the late 1990s who went on to play basketball at Old Dominion University. There's Monica Shields, a multi-sport phenom in the late 1970s at Central High School, where she once scored 56 points in a basketball game before playing at Delaware State.

There's Kimberly Wert Ripley, a 2017 Nandua grad who had a stellar career at the University of Missouri, where she is the school's all-time leader in home runs.

And there's Brook Browning Lusby, a 1982 Broadwater product who went on to play hoops at the University of Richmond.

And 2022 Chincoteague grad Emma Jackson, who set a single-season home run record at East Carolina last spring.

Certainly there are others worth consideration, but the conversation must include Northampton's Rylee Coates, who arguably might belong at the top of the list. Coates wraps up an extraordinary track and field career this weekend in the VHSL Class 1 state championships, held at James Madison University.

She is competing in seven events — 100 dash, 100 hurdles, 300 hurdles, high jump, pole vault, long jump, and triple jump. She is defending state champ in the 100 hurdles, long jump, and pole vault.

Coates' resumé of track and field accomplishments is jaw-dropping. A few highlights include:

- 4-time MVP at state championships
- 16-time state champion

- 13-time state meet record holder
- 28 school records (13 at Northampton, 15 at Broadwater Academy)

"She is a once-in-a-generation athlete," says Nicholas Mayers, head coach of the Virginia Beach Flames Track & Field Club, one of the facilities where Coates has trained in recent years. "In my 30 years of coaching, she is the most versatile athlete I've ever had. She is leaving a lasting legacy."

"She's wrapping up a remarkable high school career," adds Northampton coach Oliver Bennett. "Over the past four years, she has truly been the

cornerstone of our program."

Coaches at the University of Delaware certainly noticed. Coates has signed with the Blue Hens, where she will compete in multi-events like the pentathlon and heptathlon, as well as other individual events.

"She's a really good fit for our program," said Delaware assistant coach Sebastian O'Neill, who started recruiting Coates last spring. "Her passion for the sport and high level of interest in Delaware, along with her ability to be solid in multiple events, were the reasons we recruited her."

A humble winner

Despite Coates' impressive credentials, none of it has gone to her head. Yes, she's proud of her achievements, and she is particularly proud of winning an incredible eight events at the district championships two weeks ago — a likely national record. (Virginia is one of few states that allow athletes to enter more than four or five events.)

"That was a big accomplishment," she says quietly. "That's a highlight for me."

But all her coaches — including her parents, Greg and Kim Coates — describe her as humble, a modest-but-competitive champion who likes to win but never gloats.

"My coaches have taught me how to act in different situations," she says. "Bad performance or good, be humble about it. I've always been like that because I know you're going to have good and bad moments. I've fallen in races. I've fallen on my face. And there's always going to be people better than you."

But don't mistake humility for a lack of initiative. Coates may be blessed with good genes and raw talent, but she has worked extremely hard to reach this level.

Her parents noticed her athleticism right from the start. Kim Coates says that when her sister first met Rylee as an infant, she said, "Oh my gosh, she's got muscles!"

"I feel like she's always had natural muscle tone," says Kim.

Rylee started running almost as soon as she could walk — clumsily

and often falling, but she was fast.

“As a toddler, it was a problem going to the beach because she’d run right into the water,” says Greg. “It was difficult to keep up with her.”

In preschool, Rylee played soccer and softball. In elementary school, she turned to gymnastics and quickly rose through the ranks. In fourth grade, she entered her first race — a one-mile fun run for kids as part of the Shamrock Marathon in Virginia Beach.

Despite no training, she completed the race in less than 6½ minutes, exceptional for a 10-year-old girl. Greg, who ran cross country in high school, thought he had a budding distance runner on his hands. And indeed, Rylee ran cross country as a middle schooler at Broadwater Academy. But by the time she started Northampton as a freshman, she was focusing on shorter races, including hurdles. And she was drawn to field events.

A thousand bay crossings

During her two years in gymnastics, Rylee was training five or six days per week in Virginia Beach. The family round trips across the bay continued in middle and high school as she worked with various track and field coaches, including Mayers with the Flames club and Ty

Guzman at Poseidon Vault.

The treks across the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel have added up — Rylee estimates a thousand round trips over the last 10 years — but have been well worth the time and the costs. It has been the only way Rylee has been able to find competition at her level.

“I love being on the Shore and being in a small school,” she says. “But if my parents didn’t take me to those clubs or private lessons across the bay, I wouldn’t be going to Delaware (a Division I school). I’d probably be going Division III at best.”

Over the years, Coates has missed out on some things that are part of a “normal” kid’s life — pool parties, sleepovers, school dances. And

she’s missing her senior class trip this weekend to King’s Dominion.

“There definitely were a lot of sacrifices,” she says. “But when you want to do well in your sport, you have to make sacrifices.”

Since signing with Delaware — where she intends to major in elementary education — the trips across the bay have decreased, and Coates will have a slower summer than usual this year. She wanted more time to soak up her senior year

at Northampton, and she wants to be well-rested for starting her college career. She’s been pushing herself so hard the last few years, she wants to give her body a break.

But not quite yet. There are still seven events waiting for her at the state meet.

“I hope to defend my state titles in the 100 hurdles, pole vault, and long jump,” she says. “But mostly, I just want to do my best and leave it all out there.”

Chandler and squad win Bagwell tourney

Bill Chandler may be a bit past his prime at 76, but he has still got game when it comes to golf.

Chandler’s team, certainly aided by Sinjin Jones, winner of the past eight club championships, plus the

current senior winner club champion, Tom Watkins, and Jim Gale, posted a 59 in the advanced best ball format to edge the team of Jeff Kelley, Dustin Aigner, Clay Wardius, and John Graham by a shot.

Finishing third, with a 61, was the foursome of Devin Smith, Dustin Skees, Richard Buscher, and Terry Higbee.

Lee Stevenson won closest to the pin with a shot 14’4” from the pin on hole number 9. He was exactly one foot closer than a shot by Tammy Mason, of the Weichert Realty team, the major sponsor of the tournament.

Hilary Hartnett-Wilson, executive director of the Eastern Shore

of Virginia Historical Society for the past 10 years, said Bagwell, who passed away two years ago at the age of 75, was a major force for the Eastern Shore Historical Society. “He was a longtime board member and a past vice president. He loved history and was instrumental in our mission of preserving Eastern Shore history.”

Bill Bagwell’s wife, Claudia, thanked the golfers for their support of Shore History prior to the start of the tournament. “Dental hygienists help keep people healthy, not just their teeth,” Edwards said. “This program will train more hygienists our community really needs and give people on the Eastern Shore a chance at a good-paying job without having to

move away. That’s a win for our community and for Eastern Shore Rural Health. I am very excited to be working in partnership with our local college to help promote and support this program.”

Working on the mechanics of bringing this program to reality was Ramzi Ockaili, ESCC vice president of academic affairs, student success, and workforce development.

“This partnership reflects what is possible when educational institutions and community healthcare leaders unite around a shared vision,” Ockaili said. “By joining forces, I feel we show how rural colleges can serve as powerful catalysts for innovation, opportunity, and regional transformation.”

Offering a dental hygienist program at ESCC depends on approval from the

Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges and the Commission on Dental Accreditation. While the partner schools are optimistic about receiving this approval, acceptance into the program cannot be confirmed until approval from both or-

ganizations is received.

The Commission on Dental Accreditation approval is expected in August 2026 and approval from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges is expected in late fall 2026.

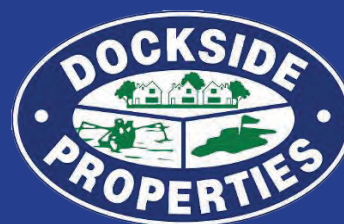

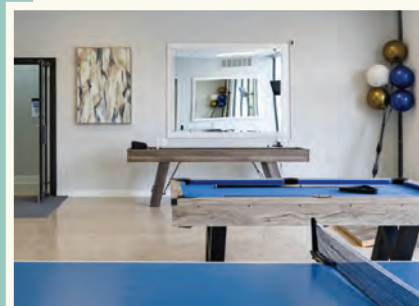

Shots were fired at emergency medical personnel as they arrived at the scene and exited an ambulance. Crippen was jailed without bond.

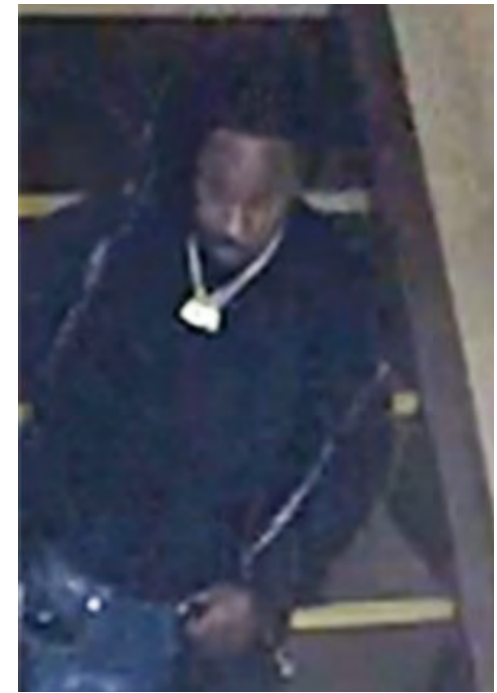
Investigators are seeking to identify and speak with the individuals pictured as part of the ongoing investigation.

Hurricane season has begun, so should prep

Virginians are being encouraged to take steps now to prepare their homes, businesses, and communities for potential severe weather this summer and fall following the official June 1 start of the 2026 Atlantic hurricane season in Virginia.

"As Atlantic hurricane season begins, I urge every Virginian to take the time now to review their emergency plans and make sure their families are fully prepared for the months ahead," said Gov. Abigail Spanberger. "Whether you live in Hampton Roads, Southwest Virginia, or anywhere in between, severe weather can impact every community across our commonwealth. By taking steps to prepare now, we can save lives, protect property, and lessen the damage to local communities when storms threaten Virginia."

Hurricane season runs from June 1 through November 30, with the greatest risk for Virginia typically occurring from late summer into early fall.

Tropical systems can bring damaging winds, flooding rains, tornadoes, storm surge along the coast, and prolonged power

outages far inland.

Emergency officials stress that preparation before a storm develops is the most effective way to stay safe.

Take the following steps to prepare for hurricane season:

- Build or refresh an emergency kit with enough food, water, medications, batteries, flashlights, and essential supplies to last at least three days.

- Know your evacuation zone and evacuation routes, especially for residents in coastal and low-lying flood-prone areas.

- Review family emergency plans, including how family members will communicate if separated.

- Sign up for local emergency alerts and monitor trusted weather information throughout the season.

- Prepare important documents by storing insurance records, identification, and medical information in a waterproof container or secure digital location.

- Check generators and backup power sources safely before they are needed.

- Make a plan for pets, including food, medications, and transportation.

Since 2001, more than 1,350 scholarships totaling \$1.4 million have been awarded to graduating seniors pursuing college, technical, or trade education.
